COMMUNITY GUIDE FOR PARENTS & GUARDIANS

REPORTING CRIME - A COMMUNITY GUIDE

'Solidarity Against Hate'

In a non-emergency you can phone 101 or you can choose to Report the crime online using google, search for the keywords 'Greater Manchester Police report a crime' <https://www.gmp.police.uk/ro/report/ocra/af/how-to-report-a-crime/>

It can take less than five minutes to report a crime online and unlike a phone call, at the end of the report you can keep a file of your report as evidence. Ensure you save the PDF and write down the reference number as the PDF does not contain the crime number.

If the police do not contact you within 48 hours or you are unhappy with their response, you can request GMP to carry out their duties by reporting your case as a complaint, this will ensure that either a sergeant or inspector will contact you to discuss not only the handling of the case but a full review of your case. Report every crime, no matter how small, at the bare minimum demand the police record your incident as a crime.

LIAISE ONE ON ONE WITH YOUR ASSIGNED OFFICER

48 hours after submitting your crime report, you can phone 101 and ask for the name and badge number of the Officer allocated to handle your case. They can also leave notes for the Officer.

Once you have the Officers badge number, you can email them directly by taking their badge number, for example Officer Smith, badge number 12345. You can then Email that Officer directly via 12345@gmp.police.uk. You are within your rights to ask for regular updates and what action the Officer has taken to take your case forward. If you are unhappy that they have not responded or found their response unsatisfactory, make a formal complaint using the above URL.

VICTIMS RIGHT TO REVIEW

'REQUEST' A REVIEW OF A POLICE DECISION NOT TO CHARGE'

If a suspect has been identified and interviewed and either full charges have not been brought or no further action. You have the right to pursue a 'Victims Right to Review' application.

Simply follow the below URL and complete the online form, this will request that the CPS & GMP assign the case to a new Officer who will review all evidence and decisions made, providing you with a detailed outcome regarding your case.

WHAT IS HATE CRIME?

Hate crimes and hate incidents are when someone is abusive, harasses you, makes threats or is violent towards you because of who you are or who the person committing the crime thinks you are.

ANY CRIME THAT TARGETS THE FOLLOWING IDENTITIES IS A HATE CRIME:

- Disability
- Race or ethnicity
- Religion or belief (which includes non-belief)
- Gender identity
- Sexual orientation

HATE CRIME CAN INCLUDE:

- Name calling
- Online or cyber-bullying
- Attack or violence
- Damage or graffiti

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO IF YOU EXPERIENCE OR WITNESS HATE CRIME?

It is important if you experience or witness hate crime that you report it to a teacher, family member or responsible adult. There are lots of services that can provide support...
